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FROM THE PASTOR



What began almost three years ago as a one year interim has transpired into a three year pastorate that is soon coming to an end. While we have accomplished many things together, having a permanent pastor has always been the goal. To this end, I welcome the appointment of Rev. Dr. Robert Sorozan to be Prospect's next pastor. You can be sure of a smooth transition – Bob and I have known each other for many years and worked together in other settings. I believe he is the right person at the right time for Prospect Church. I am counting on all of you to open wide your hearts and arms and enthusiastically embrace your new pastor and his wife, Terri.

So that there is no misunderstanding, you should hear from me that I will honor our United Methodist code of ministerial ethics. That is, after June 30 I can't perform pastoral services for members or others related to Prospect Church. Our bishop is very serious about this; pastors can be defrocked for violations! To be specific, this means that I will not be able to preside at funerals, weddings or baptisms. If my schedule permits, I can attend such services as a guest but I can't officiate. Having had to honor this dictum in seven previous churches, I assure you it isn't easy from my point of view. Still, it must be so; I can be your friend, but I can't be your pastor. If you would like to discuss this with me before the end of June, I'd be glad to talk with you.

"Retirement" is a word I have had trouble using in the past months. But it is officially what I am doing. I will not, however, be retiring from ministry. I feel the need to say that. Until the day I die or the day I no longer make sense (whichever comes first!), I will serve Christ and Church, paid or unpaid. Retirement for me means, besides having my pension benefits kick in, that I get to decide what God wants me to do. For 41 years I've delegated that decision to a bishop of the church. Now, I sort of get to get it wholesale rather than retail. I am very excited, have many ideas in mind, but also recognize that I need to avoid saying yes to anything too quickly. Likely, I will continue as the bishop's assistant on a very part-time basis. But, for the rest of the time, I get to decide what to do!

My last Sunday in Prospect's pulpit will be June 5 though I will serve pastorally and administratively through June. I will have many words of gratitude to express in the coming weeks, but for now I want to say thank you for the joy of being part of the Prospect family and the high privilege of being your pastor.

Nothing would make me happier than to be able to serve you communion one more time and say good-bye personally. If I've baptized your child, I'd especially love to see him or her again!

Create A Welcoming Environment

"Welcoming" is a life-long journey for the whole church community. Creating a welcoming and hospitable climate begins at the curb and continues into the heart of the congregation. The ministry of welcoming is not the responsibility of a few people or a committee. It is the responsibility of the entire church family.

Failing to greet a visitor says a lot about us. First impressions are lasting ones.... People often make up their mind about our church within the first 10 minutes of contact.

Greet anyone, member or guest. Please make a special effort to greet the people you don't already know. How? Engage people you don't know in conversation. It can be as simple as, "Hi! My name is _____ and I don't think we've met. What's your name?"

It takes guests about three minutes to exit the church after worship so it is important to make sure someone has made contact with them before they leave.

Prospect's service was very similar to what he attended back in Bahrain and he felt drawn to continue to worship here.

Alecia Bohan is originally from Durham, CT where she was brought up in the Methodist Church in Yalesville. "I attended the University of Connecticut, lived and taught Spanish in North Carolina for a couple of years and now teach at Lewis Mills High School in Burlington. I am a mother to a three-year-old, Cody, and am thrilled to be expecting a second son this summer. My hobbies include reading, bargain shopping, listening to music, and spending time with loved ones," Alecia notes.

Alecia, her husband, Branden, and Cody lived in Hubert, NC, for two years while Branden was stationed at Camp Lejeune. During that time, she became a member of Oak Grove United Methodist Church in Hubert. They moved back to Connecticut about a year ago. Upon buying a home in Burlington, Alecia looked forward to finding a Methodist church to attend. She finds it important to be a voice for those who do not have one, particularly children and animals, and enjoys advocating for their rights.

■ Book of Remembrance, Special Gift or Fund?

Upon a loved one's death usually friends and family want to establish some kind of memorial. At Prospect we suggest one of three choices for the surviving family members.



- Suggest, in lieu of flowers, one make a gift to the Prospect United Methodist Church (PUMC) Book of Remembrance (BOR) fund. This money is combined with other memorials. Together, these funds are used for furnishings and capital improvements for the Sanctuary and Chapel (to last at least 10 years). The bereaved family may make recommendations to the BOR committee.
- The bereaved family may make a specific gift to the church. This gift would be submitted to the PUMC Trustees for acceptance. Conditions and restrictions to such gifts, if accepted by Trustees, will remain in effect until such time as the bereaved family makes changes. If no bereaved family members are available, then the Bristol Probate court or its successors would determine changes to the conditions and restrictions.
- Establishment of a Fund is another alternative for those wishing to honor a loved one. Conditions and restrictions for use of the fund would be accepted by the PUMC Trustees. For instance, donors may limit the use to interest and growth from the initial donation.

For significant gifts, consultation with a CPA or Tax Attorney is suggested. PUMC is able to receive Charitable Remainder Trusts, Life Insurance, Stock and other such gifts as the donor may desire as part of one's estate planning. The chairman of the Trustees would meet with your estate planner to accomplish honoring your loved one or to provide a legacy for your family.

There will not be 8:30 a.m. services during June nor on July 3rd. The 8:30 a.m. services will resume July 10.

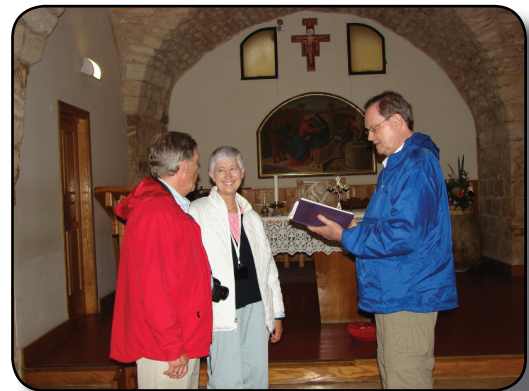
Fifth Trip To Holy Land For Pastor Dennis

Prospect's pastor, the Rev. Dr. Dennis Winkleblack, made his fifth trip to the Holy Land from March 22 to 31. His wife, Jeanne, has been there four times. Pastor Dennis was accompanied by Chris and Jill Wilson and Don and Janne Workman, the smallest group he has escorted. He has previously escorted groups ranging in size from a dozen to 20-plus, "which means I was always counting noses, checking in to see who was feeling well and who wasn't, listening to complaints, etc. This time, therefore, was extra special because I had so few to worry about. I was able to give better attention to guides and have more time for reflection."

The trip was under the auspices of Florida-based Educational Opportunities. Except for the first day, the weather was 60-70 degrees with blue skies, he relates. In the past, "Bad weather had often been a distraction -- rain and cold make one want to get back on the bus more than stand and listen to a guide! Each trip has been special, but this trip was extra special ... also helped by the reality that most likely this was my last trip. We were on a 48-passenger bus with mostly other UM's from around the country and everyone got along very well."

The group took a non-stop flight from JFK Airport to Ben Gurion in Tel Aviv. They stayed in two hotels: one overlooking the Sea of Galilee and the other in downtown Jerusalem. "Security was obvious and heavy. While waiting for luggage screening on our return we were startled by whistles blowing and security people running and then the announcement to clear out of the terminal. Apparently something looked dangerous in the x-ray machines used to screen all baggage. But all was well," Dennis said.
