

June is almost here! So you all know what that means; it's time for the 213th session of the New York Annual Conference. Yea!!! This is the time when clergy and lay members gather at Hofstra University, on Long Island, to worship, conduct church business and have fellowship with each other.

Admittedly, it isn't easy to get excited about a four-day business meeting. But it is important to look beyond the "business" portion of the Conference to see what it represents. When we gather, we have fellowship with other congregations, we share our struggles, and we share our blessings. We have an opportunity to learn from each other and we focus on the things that truly matter. What it represents, to me, is an organization in mission.

Mission is an important word to remember. A few years ago, one would find it hard to apply that word to our Conference; we were not really considered a "mission-oriented" Conference. So at a previous session of the New York Annual Conference, we voted to make missions a top priority. Since then we have raised over \$ 2,000,000 for the victims of hurricanes, we have sent mission teams to Haiti and Africa, the Gulf Coast and to churches in our Conference struggling to recover from the effects of flooding last fall. We have worked with Conference youth to understand different cultures and we have worked hard at developing ministries in fast growing populations in Connecticut and New York. The New York Annual Conference is involved in mission.

PROSPECT IN EARLIER DAYS

Former President Visits Prospect The June 18th, 1917 issue of the The Bristol Press heralded the visit of former President William Howard Taft to Prospect Methodist Episcopal Church the night before. The long story began, "Bristol has had many distinguished visitors and listened to many distinguished speakers but to none more famous than William Howard Taft; to none has she accorded a more hearty welcome, and to none has she listened with a keener or more appreciative interest or greater satisfaction."



Since it's the one and only time a former President has visited the church, it seems appropriate to explore aspects of the visit and talk in several Prospect In Earlier Days columns, but it is not easy to do because the photo copy of The Press page is of poor quality. the purpose of the visit was a big rally to promote the Red Cross.

Taft, a Republican who hailed from Ohio and was the heaviest to serve as Chief Executive in terms of stature, served as President from 1909 through 1913. He also had many other claims to fame: Chief Justice of the United States from 1921 through 1930 (the only President to become Chief Justice following the Presidency); Provisional Governor Cuba, 1906; U.S. Secretary of War, 1904-1908; Governor-General of the Philippines, 1901-1903; U.S. Court of Appeals, Sixth Circuit, 1892-1892; and U.S. Solicitor General, 1890-1892 during the term of President Benjamin Harrison.

The headline the day after the visit read "Because We're Rich," followed by the subhead "Justified Position of United States Entry Into the War at Big Red Cross Rally at Prospect M. E. Church Last Evening — Heartily Greeted by the 2,000 Present."

Future Towers will elaborate on the visit, and local reaction to it.

The fact that the flowers are accompanied by a personal visit from someone who is connected to Prospect is a bonus to the home-bound recipients. She completed the task within a few days after Easter.


■ PUMC Cookbook Project
