## Pastor's Page

What do we need to do to get you to invite someone to church on Sunday morning? We've had our meeting with "Mister Big" — I mean the District Superintendent. It was a very productive meeting. In fact, it was so productive we had to take a little time to process it. The meeting lasted late into the evening and so we carried it on to our Church Council meeting the following week.



The "Genesis" of the meeting is very easy to understand. Our congregation is aging and we have lost some very special and very important people this past year. We have some very good signs of life: our Sunday School is growing, our Steven's Ministry has just graduated its first class of students and we have some very good volunteers doing important work around our church. But, looking at where our congregation will be 10 years from now, will our participation slowly evaporate away? The trend for mainline congregations is alarming — will Prospect United Methodist Church be a part of the alarming mainline statistics?



Invite a Neighbor to Church

One way or another, change has to come to our congregation. We have to work hard to make sure that the change will be positive. Our District Superintendent, who has much experience in revitalizing congregations, is encouraging us to grow. It is easy to give up and say "what will be, will be." Instead, he is encouraging us all to do the challenging work of evangelism.

What do we need to do to attract new members? One of the suggestions is to create "blended" worship services where the music and structure of the service will speak to a new generation of worshippers. I will admit that this was a little hard to for me to hear — I am the one who puts together our services and select the music. I confess that after doing this for 32 years, I like the old hymns — they feel comfortable. But, in the interest of reaching a new generation of people, maybe we all could try a few new praise hymns. remember that Charles Wesley set many of his most cherished hymns to the tune of tavern, drinking, songs. If Charles Wesley could be flexible with his music in reaching out to the un-churched, so can we!

Related to this, I admit that I get used to things really quickly — this is one of the beneficial side effects of the Methodist itinerating system. So, I quickly find the location of the bathrooms, the nursery and the church office. Since I write up the services every week, I know the location of the hymns in the hymn book, where the prayers are located in the bulletin and when to stand up. We all know about books of the Bible and where to find the “Book of Hebrews.” But, what about people who have never stepped foot in a church their entire life — would they feel comfortable in our church? Would you feel comfortable inviting them? Many of the things we take for granted are deep mysteries to the un-churched.

Change will inevitably come to Prospect United Methodist Church. Will the change take the form of the gradual loss of members and constantly increasing financial difficulties? Will the change take the form of new and innovative programs that reach out to people who have no church home? The time to choose is now!

## ■ PRAYER SHAWL MINISTRY

An exciting movement is happening at PUMC. On Sunday mornings before the 10 a.m. service, members are gathering in Sessions Hall to knit or crochet prayer shawls. Once the shawls are completed, they are placed on the altar rail and blessed by Pastor Bob.



Anyone can take a shawl and bless someone with it. In the past two months over 30 shawls have been given away, blessing many with God's love, comfort and healing power. The Prayer Shawl Ministry originated in 1998, with Janet Severi Bristow and Victoria Galo, two graduates of the 1997 Women's Leadership Institute at The Hartford Seminary in Hartford. They developed the ministry from their experiences in the program of Applied Spiritual Ministry under the direction of Professor M. Therese Winter, MMS.

They combined compassion and the love of knitting/crocheting into a prayerful ministry and spiritual practice that reaches out to those in need of comfort and solace, as well as in celebration and joy. Many blessings are prayed into every stitch.

Whether they are called Prayer Shawls, Comfort Shawls, Peace Shawls, or Mantles, etc., the shawl maker begins with prayers and blessings for the recipient. The intentions are continued throughout the creation of the shawl. Upon completion, a cross is sewn onto one corner and a final blessing is offered before the shawl is sent on its way.

Some recipients have continued the kindness by making a shawl and passing it onto someone in need. Thus, the blessing ripples from person-to-person, with both the giver and receiver feeling the unconditional embrace of a sheltering, mothering God! The shawls can also be crocheted, quilted, woven or machine knitted as well!

## PROSPECT IN EARLIER DAYS

*Lenten Season In 1954 - Kathy Dube*

Prospect Church continued its journey through the 1954 Lenten season as highlighted in the March 26th Tower edition, continuing a review begun in our February Tower.

Mid-week Lenten services were largely attended, according to page 3 of the Tower. The series was entitled "Living Our Discipleship." Various speakers chose one of the 12 Apostles to highlight, comparing discipleship in the day of Jesus to what discipleship meant in 1954. The remaining speakers were Rev. Matthew Gates of Naugatuck Methodist Church and Rev. Frank Hoadley of Bristol Baptist Church. On another date worshippers got to watch a movie, *I Am With You*. Each program was preceded by a supper prepared by different units of the Women's Club.

Members of Prospect also participated in the remaining Lenten services sponsored by the Bristol Council of Churches. These services were held on Sunday evenings, at Trinity Episcopal Church, Bristol Baptist Church, and Prospect Church. A three-hour service was planned for Good Friday from Noon to 3 p.m. at Lebanon Lutheran Church.

A large class of adults and a class of 30 young people were to be received into membership at the church as part of the Palm Sunday morning service in April. In addition, the church would host combined Protestant choirs of the Bristol Council of Churches under the direction of Edward Graham, with Lois Dunn Clark playing the organ, Palm Sunday evening to sing the cantata "The Holy City" by Gaul.

## ■ CAMPERSHIPS AVAILABLE



# Butterfly Pretzels

Celebrate being a new creation by making this fun spring snack.



### What you need:

- 45 miniature twist pretzels (to make 20 butterflies)
- Cookie sheet covered with parchment paper
- Light cocoa and multi-colored Candy Melts (available at craft stores)
- Disposable decorating bags
- M&M's, Skittles, sprinkles, cinnamon drops, etc.

### What you do:


1. Break five pretzels into pieces for antennae.
2. On cookie sheet, arrange pairs of whole pretzels as shown.
3. Melt Candy Melts in microwave, separating colors into different bags.
4. Pipe melted brown candy down the center to hold pretzels together, making a head and body. Press on two pretzel pieces for antennae.
5. Pipe other melted candy into the pretzel holes.
6. Add M&M's and other decorations into melted candy on the wings. Let cool. Enjoy!
