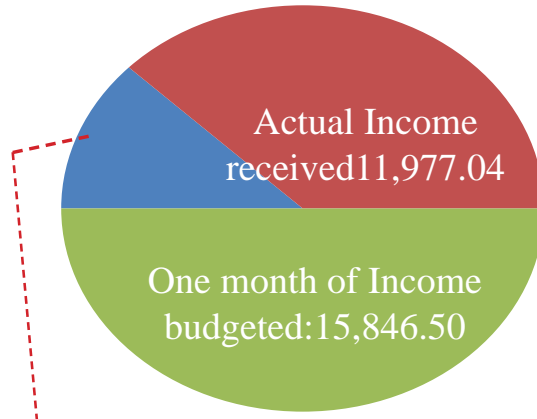

A month of snowy Sundays in January had an adverse impact on Prospect's finances. Here is an update:

If you were unable to keep up with your contributions because of the weather, please help put Prospect's income back on track to meeting the Budget!

Stewardship Chairman Chris Wilson extends thanks to all who made a financial commitment to the Stewardship Campaign. The final tally was \$122,000, up from the \$108,000 pledged for 2008. Sixty-nine families either increased their pledge(s) or are new pledgers to Prospect.

Although this is short of the \$150,000 goal, Chris says, "We made great strides towards becoming more financially stable. It will take the concerted effort of all of us over the next several years to underwrite the expenses and mission of the church."

"As we all work together, Prospect is becoming a vital and important church. Your donation and pledge coupled with those that sit next to you in the pew made it possible that we live our Christian heritage faithfully and with purpose."

## A HISTORICAL PRIMER - PART 2

According to a historical sketch from Charles L. Wooding, former church member and the first librarian in Bristol on the occasion of the centennial of Prospect Church, then known as Prospect Methodist Episcopal Church, the first Methodist Society legally established in Connecticut was located in Stratford, in 1789, with exactly three charter members Rev. Jesse Lee, a noted itinerant preacher, was the guiding force. The movement was initially opposed by the well-established Congregational Church.

The first Methodist sermon reportedly was preached in Bristol in a Baptist Church by the Rev. Nathan Bangs, presiding elder and eventual President of Wesleyan University. The sermon was based on Acts 28.22: "But

we desire to hear of thee what thou thinkest: for as concerning this sect, we know that everywhere it is spoken against." Apparently, the Methodist emphasis on emotionalism was a turn-off to the more staid Congregational church.

Following Rev. Bangs' provocative sermon, occasional meetings were held by new converts to Methodism in a schoolhouse on West Street or in private homes. Classes were taught by traveling preachers on the Burlington circuit, the first Methodist circuit established in this immediate area.

The next issue will follow the growth of the church on West Street that eventually became Prospect Methodist Episcopal Church.

## ■ "TOUCHED BY THE CHRIST" SLATED FOR PALM SUNDAY

Mark your calendars: The Senior Choir will present a moving musical performance, "Touched by the Christ" on the afternoon of April 5, Palm Sunday. According to music director Heidi Flower, the musical performance recalls the last days of Jesus' earthly life through the eyes of individuals who were directly impacted by His ministry. The music in this work composed by Lloyd Larson invites us to be changed by God's

eternal love and grace. The blending of personal narratives and music will provide the listener with a fresh look at the Messiah, who came to offer hope for the hurting and broken. The concert will begin at 4 p.m. in our sanctuary. A free-will offering will be taken.
