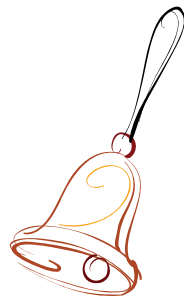

175TH ANNIVERSARY SERVICE PLANNED

Prospect United Methodist Church will celebrate a milestone anniversary on Sunday, November 8, with a special service commemorating the church's 175th anniversary. Our Pastor Emeritus, Rev. William Barnes, will assist with the service and preach the sermon. Our Interim Pastor, Rev. Dr. Dennis Winkleblack, will conduct the service and introduce some Wesley hymns that were commonly sung during the early years of the church.

To call attention to the anniversary, members of the History Committee have been giving the children's sermons at Sunday morning services during October. Members and friends will be invited to share an anniversary cake during a reception following the service.

Past Towers have detailed the history of the church back to the days when the first Methodist class was taught to local converts out of the former Burlington circuit. That history is available on Prospect's website: <http://www.gbgm-umc.org/prospect-ct/>.

Prospect United Methodist Church, once known as Prospect Methodist Episcopal Church, was incorporated in October of 1834. The first formal church building was constructed on the northern portion of West Street,

since the North Side was the most populous area of Bristol at the time. With the growth of the church after the conversion of industrialist John Humphrey Sessions, the church relocated to its present site in 1880, into a sanctuary built where Sessions Hall is situated today. Further growth necessitated the addition of the larger present sanctuary which was dedicated in 1894.

Much of the early history of the church can be found in an address by Bristol's first librarian, Charles L. Wooding, on the occasion of Prospect's centennial. Anniversary celebrations lasted several days and included numerous events at that time. For instance, the Opening Services of the 1894 expanded sanctuary took place on June 4, 5, 6 and 7. The celebration included an organ recital, Tuesday dedication services during both morning and evening, Wednesday evening service and Thursday evening service.

The church observed the sesquicentennial of the Methodist Episcopal Church and centennial of Prospect M.E. Church over a week-long period during Oct. 21-Oct. 28, 1934. The celebration included services on both Sundays and other historical programs and suppers during the week. In addition to the talk by Charles Wooding, a long-time member of the church, Arthur S. Barnes, long-time publisher of the Bristol Press and grandfather of Rev. William Barnes, recalled his boyhood days at the North Side, including his recollections of the M.E. Church. A special guest during the centennial week was Bishop Ernest G. Richardson, who served as Prospect's pastor from 1910-1912. Dr. Richardson is the only pastor of Prospect ever to be elected a bishop.

The History Committee hopes this celebration will spur the compilation of a historical booklet about Prospect at some point in the future. As 2010 will mark the 225th anniversary of the city of Bristol, Prospect plans to offer the use of the church for an event during the year.
