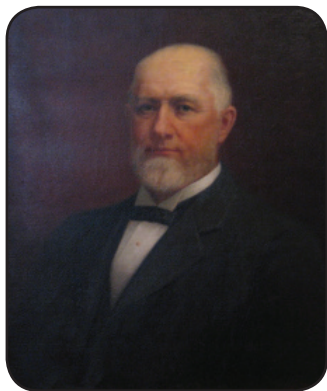
■ Be a Greeter on Sunday Mornings

PROSPECT IN EARLIER DAYS

Meet Mr. and Mrs. Sessions, Part 1

The Victorian Tea planned for December 11 at Prospect pays tribute to early benefactors William E. and his wife, Emily (Brown) Sessions. In this and several future Towers, get acquainted with these Sessions benefactors who played such a vital role in the growth of Prospect Church, then known as Prospect Methodist Episcopal Church (source: the "Builders of Bristol" series by the Bristol Press).



William Edwin Sessions was born on Feb. 18, 1857, younger son of John Humphrey Sessions who was converted to Methodism after hearing a sermon in Polkville, the Edgewood section of Bristol. William, better known as W.E., spent his youth in Polkville and first attended the local district school. He later attended Hartford High School, becoming one of three from Bristol to graduate from the school.

Preferring a business career to college, he was taken into his father's trunk hardware firm in 1878. A year later W.E. and his father took over the Bristol Foundry Company plant on Laurel Street, reorganizing it as the Sessions Foundry Company. The firm prospered to the point where a larger plant was needed some 16 years later. In 1895 a 30-acre tract of land was purchased on Farmington Avenue and a large modern factory was constructed near the site of the Hub-6 Plaza today. At the time, it was said to be one of the finest foundry plants east of Chicago.

In the next Tower, learn about Mr. Sessions' purchase of a major Bristol clock manufacturing company in 1902.

The benefit to help restore the church organ will provide holiday splendor, entertainment, food and a quiet respite during this hectic time. This pretend scenario with an English setting will recreate holiday social events that were common when Mrs. Sessions entertained at her manor house.

Come and visit the Manor — a transformed Sessions Hall — decorated for the holiday. Servants will surround you with an array of assorted scones, sweet breads, sandwiches and sweet treats as you sip your tea and listen to musical entertainment for the evening. Those who really wish to be pampered can purchase tickets to "The Parlor," where you will be seated in a private room set for the holidays. Bone china tea cups, teapots filled with a variety of teas, and a special dessert buffet will be provided in the parlor.

PROSPECT'S STEINWAY

There are certain facts relating to Prospect's Steinway that we are sure of:

- The ebony grand piano model C was manufactured in 1893.
- The piano's original owner was Ethel Gardner at Sweet Briar College.

One fact about the piano is not certain—How did the Steinway come to Prospect? Was it a gift? If so, from whom? If anyone reading this article knows the answer or knows someone who would know the answer, please contact the church office by phone or mail with a message for the Trustees. The History Committee has researched their many records and no answer can be found.

In 1998, the church received a gift from Arthur and Dorothy Funk, a Kawai grand piano, that is in the sanctuary.

In 2000, restoration work was completed on the Steinway using memorial funds designated by the Betty Lowrey family. Since then, the Steinway has been played but more recently, it is being used less frequently. Currently it is in need of rebuilding.

The financial position of the church and the need to restore the Austin organ are causing the Trustees to consider selling the Steinway. We have paid for an 'as is' market appraisal of the piano. If it is sold, the proceeds would go into the organ restoration fund.

NEW ELECTRONIC SYSTEM GIFTED

Prospect is the beneficiary of a gift in memory of long-time head usher, James Orr, helping the Technology Committee install a new projection system in the sanctuary. Peter Scandone of Pascom Sound generously provided funding for a wireless audio adapter that will allow not only the church laptop, but other audio devices such as portable CD players and IPODs to transmit audio into the sanctuary sound system.

Mr. Scandone, an audio systems engineer, worked with Jim Orr in past installations of our state-of-the-art sound system. Pastor Dennis Winkleblack notes, "I knew Jim briefly and, of course, did his funeral. He was an extraordinary gentleman, truly a gentle man who was also very smart. He was apparently also a consummate head usher whom everyone loved. Mr. Scandone apparently really appreciated and enjoyed working with Jim in the big project of installing our sound system which, of course, now is being integrated with the new video technology."

John Rioux, who chairs the Technology Committee, said the wireless audio system is comprised of a transmitter with 1/8" stereo jack that is connected to the audio device or computer and a receiver that is installed into the sound system as an additional audio channel such as one of our wireless microphones. Peter provided all materials, installation and calibration services at no cost.

The Jim Orr memorial gift saved the project \$548, which will cost approximately \$10,000 in its entirety. Roger Sonstroem donated \$5,000 towards the purchase of the system in memory of his parents, Wally and Janet. The balance is from the Book of Remembrance. This device was first used during the children's message presented by Associate Music Director Emily Flower on Sunday, October 24. Our Music Director, Heidi Flower, expressed her excitement about the capabilities of this new gizmo.

The projection system consists of an Epson PowerLite Pro G5350NL projector including long throw lens with complete wireless video capabilities which will project images to a 12' x 9' electric screen with wireless remote screen up/down operation. The existing church laptop will be utilized to run this new projection system with wireless computer network access provided through a new access point installed in Sessions Hall. This will allow for complete wireless computer network access in the sanctuary and Sessions Hall. The projection system can be driven from any computer connected to the internal church network.

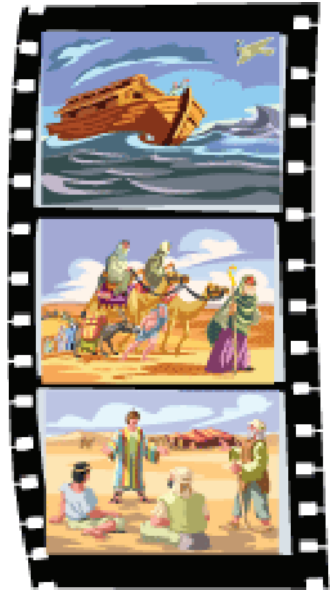
LIVING GREEN

Energy Note - Carll Pallok

Before real cold weather sets in, check all of your house windows and make sure they are shut. Any window left open even 1/8" of an inch, whether it's a double hung or a casement window, will bring in cold air. This air requires heating and will draw down any fuel you use. Especially check any windows by or near your thermostat. A small air leak will cause the heating unit to run and may over heat some other parts of your home.

Major milestones completed to date include: purchase and delivery of all system components; wiring, installation and checkout of wireless network access point in Sessions Hall; electrical AC power outlet wiring of under balcony projector location and screen power planning; and all screen hardware acquisition and planning. John Rioux, Chuck Pelky and other helpers plan to undertake the major task of hanging the screen on Halloween evening. This will require some ingenuity in order to raise the 100 lb. screen to the desired height of 19' 9" from the floor. Lastly, the projector needs to be hung under the balcony with complete calibration by vendor Eric Hauch.

Complete system installation is expected by mid-November, barring any unforeseen tricks caused by Halloween gremlins.
