From the Pastor's Pen

Dear Friends:

Prospect Church has suffered some serious blows recently. A decision about a limited access agreement for sexual offenders has cost us several treasured long time members. In addition, there is a significant shortfall in offerings and the realization that we can no longer tap the endowment fund for help in the way we have been. And we have other concerns as well, including the reality of large increases in fuel and utility costs for our church building.



In my sermon September 7th, I noted some of these challenges, informed folks that church leaders are working overtime to address them, and also stated what scripture proclaims and experience confirms: at the core of any successful church are members dedicated to worshipping together regularly.

I closed the sermon by stating that without sacrifices by every person who loves this church there will be no future together as a church in any way close to what we have known. This includes the "sacrifice" of worshipping God as a church family.

Your church needs you now more than ever. Yes, we will ask you for money, for time and for the best of your talents. If you give them we have a chance -- a good chance. If you don't, we don't

■ NATURAL CHURCH DEVELOPMENT: OUR MINIMUM FACTOR - TIM KRAUSS

In last month's article, an extremely brief explanation of Natural Church Development (NCD) was provided along with a reminder about the survey that was completed in January and some information about how we will proceed with NCD. This month we will describe our minimum factor and introduce your NCD Church Health Team.



What is our minimum factor? The survey results identified “Passionate Spirituality” as the minimum factor for Prospect. This growth characteristic scored lowest on the survey so it is the area of our life that we will work to improve first. Thinking and praying about our minimum factor and working to improve it will help us remove the human interference that blocks the natural God-given ability for growth that exists in our church. Passionate Spirituality includes how we experience God, our passion for Prospect UMC and the greater Christian Church, our passion for devotions, and our spiritual interconnectedness. Put in a different way, our weak point right now is our enthusiasm for our God, our Church, our prayer life, and each other.

What is a Church Health Team? And who are the members of our team? This is a small group of people who act as a steering committee and think tank to coordinate the church's efforts on the NCD process. We work with our pastor and a trained coach provided by the New York Annual Conference. Our coach is Rev. Chuck Naugle, who is the pastor at the UMC in North Canton. The job of the Church Health Team is to identify ways that we can all improve our minimum factor together, work with the Church Council and committees to ensure that the church makes steady progress, and to report on that progress. Our team began last year with Diane Ashworth, Tim Krauss, Jackie Palance, Jane Pallokat, the Church Council Chairperson (Rita Fasci), and the pastor.

With the new year our Church Council Chairperson has changed to Jill Wilson and Pastor Dennis has joined us. Jane has asked to be replaced so that she can focus on other responsibilities. We thank Rita and Jane for their efforts. We are looking for one or two more people with a passion for any of the elements of Passionate Spirituality who would like to help improve this part of our faith life.

How do we find out about NCD?

There is a display in Sessions Hall about our survey results. A presentation about NCD was made after worship on Sept. 21 and our survey results were discussed in detail at the Sept. 23 Church Council meeting. Information from these events will soon be available on the church Website and in the literature racks at the church. What’s next? It is expected that information about NCD and what Passionate Spirituality means to us as a congregation will be woven into our worship on Laity Sunday in October. Also, watch for another NCD article in the November Tower about the next steps in our journey to increase our passionate spirituality together.
